





with a firm that could hold the future to resolving the issue of a commuter rail crossing at the New River downtown.

Senior city staff and I recently took a trip to Washington, D.C., to engage in discussions

The name of this firm is Meridiam, a company which was part of a consortium that built the tunnel linking downtown Miami to the adjacent port.

The French-based firm specializes in developing, financing and managing long-term public infrastructure projects. And, it has been closely following the debate in Fort Lauderdale between whether a tunnel or bridge should be built for the rail system.

We spent almost two hours talking to Meridiam's North American executives about the project's status, why the city favors a tunnel and what hurdles lie ahead for each New River crossing concept.

They were very interested in what we proposed. We hope Meridiam will start a dialoque with the county and the Florida Department of Transportation about building the tunnel as a public-private partnership.

This approach, also known as a P3, is how they built the port tunnel for Miami. That project came in under budget and ahead of schedule with the work occurring in a geotechnical environment very similar to that in Fort Lauderdale.

In our meeting, city officials and our consultants laid out the problematic nature of a bridge, particularly its impact on the marine industry and surrounding street-level traffic.

NEW WTP WILL NOT PREVENT RUSTY WATER FROM REACHING YOUR FAUCET

The City's new Water Treatment Plant (WTP) currently under construction at the Prospect Lake Clean Water Center will employ nanofiltration and ion-exchange process to treat raw well water to produce about 85 percent of treated water that has removed objectionable health and pollution ingredients to produce about 50 million gallons of finished water for the city's utility customers which includes 5 other cities. The finished water will be pumped to the existing Fiveash WTP where high service pumps will transmit same through the large diameter water transmission mains ultimately through the smaller diameter water distribution mains to serve the various neighborhoods including the other aforementioned utility customers.

The attached photograph shows an old cast iron water main interior that has deteriorated with extensive tuberculation (accumulated rust) inside the pipe

that diminishes the velocity (flow) and quality of the drinking water. Unfortunately, there still exists many of the old pipe throughout the city that undoes the extensive treatment resulting in rust colored water reaching your faucet. The city continues to replace these deteriorated old water mains throughout the city and hopefully in time this rust and discoloration will be diminished significantly from our drinking water.

Hello District 1,

I hope this message finds you well as we move into the spring season! With longer days and warmer weather, it's a great time to focus on community improvements and ongoing projects. As always, I remain committed to addressing the issues that matter most to District 1 residents. Two key topics have been at the forefront of neighborhood concerns: roadway conditions and the new noise ordinance. I'd like to take a moment to share the latest updates from City staff on both matters.

Roadways, Alleyways, and Sidewalk Assessment

On November 8, 2024, the City's consultant, Jacobs, submitted the final citywide Condition Assessment Summary for roadways, alleyways, and sidewalks within Fort Lauderdale's Public Right of Way to the Public Works Department. Using light detection and ranging (LiDAR) data collected in Fall 2022, Jacobs conducted an assessment based on the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) Pavement Condition Index (PCI) scoring.

Based on PCI scoring, roadways and alleyways were categorized as Good, Satisfactory, Fair, Poor, Very Poor, Serious, or Failed. GIS maps were created to visualize these conditions across the city, including District 1.

In our district, 141.5 lane miles were assessed. I'm pleased to report that 94.5% of roadways in District 1 fall within the Good to Fair categories, with none classified as Failed. The remaining 5.5% are in Poor to Serious condition. This report is a valuable tool in helping the City identify areas that need attention and prioritize roadway improvements accordingly.





Broward County Countywide Risk Assessment

The Broward County Commission held a workshop to discuss the results of the Countywide Resilience Risk Assessment and the draft Countywide Resilience Plan. With the increased flooding events in our area, it is vital to discuss policies and investments that will protect our communities. The two-year countywide planning efforts was designed to address flood mitigation, the impacts of sea-level rise, more intense rainfall and more. The project also assessed the economic, financial risk and credit impacts that the County will face due to future conditions. Ultimately, we

know that policy and specific strategies will be an important part of implementation, providing a substantial reduction in damages countywide. Proposed strategies deliver \$8 to \$30 Billion in residential property value preservation, avoid up to \$4 Billion in asset damages, and preserve \$20 Billion in flood insurance coverage, with an 83% reduction in damages county-wide. Some investments will happen organically, others will be more deliberate, but policy and regulations will be an important part of implementation. LATE FILING EXEMPTION DEADLINE - SEPTEMBER 17, 2025

Your Homestead Exemption automatically renews each year provided there is no change in the ownership or use of the property. If you are already receiving Homestead Exemption on your current home, you do not need to reapply.

If you have not yet applied for your 2025 Homestead Exemption, Limited-Income Senior Exemption or any other exemption, you can still file until September 17, 2025. To view all the tax-saving exemptions available to qualified applicants, please visit our website.

Senior Exemption: This exemption is both age and income-based and must be applied for separately from the Homestead Exemption. To be eligible for this exemption, an applicant must be age 65 or older as of January 1, 2025 and have a household adjusted gross income for 2024 not exceeding \$37,694. Here is the link to the Senior Exemption requirements and online application for your review.

Disability Exemption: This exemption is available to every blind person or totally and permanently disabled person who is a bona fide resident of Florida. Please click here to view all the Disability Exemptions.

Veteran & Military Exemptions: Veterans with a service-connected disability and the un-remarried surviving spouse are entitled to an additional exemption. An active duty servicemember who is receiving Homestead Exemption may qualify for an additional exemption if deployed outside the United States serving in support of designated military operations. Please visit our website to review the Veteran & Military Exemption requirements and to apply online.

Surviving Spouse of First Responder Exemption: Un-remarried surviving spouses of a first responder who died in the line of duty may be eligible for an exemption of the full assessed value of a Homesteaded property. Here is the link to the exemption requirements.

Once the September 17, 2025 statutory "late filing" deadline has closed, we cannot accept any more 2025 exemption applications regardless of any good cause reason for missing the late filing deadline.

Property owners who moved to a new home in 2025 can pre-file for tax year 2026. To apply for a new Homestead Exemption, please visit our website.


